

Hello guys, it's me Manny, one of the many hard working servers at Masa! If you would have asked me a few months ago how I was going to spend the

first half of my summer, I would have had a ready answer for you: "Why watching the World Cup of course!" Now while some of that might still happen (thanks to my TiVo) the real news is that I'll be interning at City Council President Eric Garcetti's field office in Hollywood!


How did this happen? Well, I had the good fortune of serving the Councilman dinner at Masa one night and asked him about any opportunities to help out. Much to my surprise, I was called to interview for an internship with Echo Park Field Deputy, Alejandra Mar-

roquin - and now here I am with two weeks under my belt and I absolutely love it.

When I first found out I had gotten the position, I was told by some of my Masa coworkers to get used to getting coffees, since that's a common belief about internships, but I haven't made a single coffee run yet – in fact, I was given real responsibility up top and was put in charge of recruiting Block Captains for the Councilman's UNTAG program - Uniting Neighborhoods to Abolish Graffiti - what an honor!

How does UNTAG work? We go out into the commu-

nity and recruit Block Captains - dedicated members of the community like you - who monitor and report graffiti to the city's 3-1-1 with the location of the graffiti, the



To combat repeat taggers, Block Captains also monitor graffiti over a designated area. A wall, a city block, the route to your child's school, are all great examples of areas where a Block Captain can make a difference. So far, UNTAG's efforts have helped reduce graffiti

district-wide by 85%!

The annual cost of graffiti removal to the city of Los Angeles is 7.5 million dollars. We all wish we could spend this money on things like more after-school programs, but graffiti removal is important to maintaining a healthy community. Graffiti is more than just a nuisance, it can lead to real violence. If taggers see that their "efforts" are not staying up very long, they will eventually give up. Just look around our neighborhood here. Those of you who were around in the 90's might remember that

# Lady of the Lake statue vandalized... again

The Echo Park Lake statue, Lady of the Lake or Nuestra Reina de Los Angeles, is now missing both hands probably due to vandalism. Residents noticed the problem as far back as the Lotus Festival.

Repaired as recently of May 2009, the statue may not get its needed repairs soon. GEPENC President Jose Sigala commented on an Eastsider LA online article, writing:

"Given the city's budget financial crisis, I am not sure where the funding many come from to repair the lady of the Lake.

"I am not sure what the cost may be to replace the statue's hands but I would like to commit to work with other community members in identifying and raising the funds to restore her hands.

"I will ask to see if any of the funding that is dedicated to the rehabilitation of the lake may be used to assist in



repairing the statue."

The EPIA will be taking action on the matter to get the iconic statue repaired as soon as possible





Below is a list of the purposed new activity to start in August 2010 at Spiraling Orchard located at 1246 W Court St., Los Angeles, CA 90026.

We will be hosting Local artist, Timoi and her Graffiti Club for Youth throughout Summer 2010.

Ayumi "SANO" Chisolm has just joined ACLA staff through a DCAAIR grant and will be teaching a weekly visual art/drawing workshop. # **Bungalow court declared city landmark**

from the Echo Park Historical Society

The Lento Brick Court on Sunset Boulevard Elysian Park has been declared a historic-cultural monument by the City of Los Angeles.

The 1928 complex built by an Italian immigrant and hat maker was nominated by the Echo Park Historical Society as a "rare example of a mixed use complex of



commercial store fronts and a residential hillside bungalow court."

The Lento Brick Court, located in the 1200 block of Sunset Boulevard, is one of several hillside bungalow courts found on both sides of Sunset Boulevard between Elysian Park Avenue and Marion Street. This type of courtyard housing was popular among builders and residents during the early part of the 20th Century. In Echo Park, the builders of these bungalows courts adapted their developments to the hilly terrain, creating terraces of tiny homes that climbed the steep hills.

Historian Charlie Fisher researched the property and filed the landmark nomination on behalf of the EPHS.

### **Patton Alianza Coalition**

Temple Street is a heavily traveled street in the southern edge of Echo Park. It brings drivers from downtown up a long and winding street that curves as it reaches the corner of Patton Street, an area lined with trees, craftsman homes, apartment buildings, and a state building. The setting denotes a quiet and cozy street, but it is really a dangerous intersection and has been for many years.

On the afternoon of Friday July 16, 2010, a pedestrian was struck as she was crossing the street at the corner of Patton Street and taken to the hospital. The concerns felt by the residents in the area have led to the creation of the Patton Alianza Coalition, a neighborhood group to meet and discuss the accident.

The group has contacted the Council Office of CD-1 and the Department of Transportation, and will be working with the staff to mitigate the issues at this corner and other issues in the immediate area. The residents can no longer be silent regarding this intersection, as there is growing concern that the next time it might be a child.

# **Echo Park Real Estate Trends for June and July**

Echo Park sales for the months of June and July (source: TheMls.com)

Sold properties: 21

• Single family homes: 12 at \$180,000 to \$727,000

• Median price: \$410,241

• Condos: 2 at \$320,000 to \$323,000

• Median price: \$321,500

Income property: 7 at \$285,000 to \$635,000

• Median price of \$468,000

**Sales Trends:** Inventory in Echo Park is low. There is a long list of properties with foreclosure filings but there are very few available for sale. The volume of short sale activity has risen but there is no guarantee that any short sale will close unless it is pre-approved by the bank. The key to determining whether to participate in the short sale process, from a buying or selling perspective, is to determine the likelihood of it closing prior to entering the process.

**Buyer Trends:** There has been a noticeable dip in overall homebuyer activity since the expiration of the federal tax credit incentive in April. First time home buyer activity peaked in March and has tapered off since then. The percentage of first time homebuyers has dropped from 48% in March to 42% in June. A healthy home buying market requires a strong pool of first time home buyers. Inventory is expected to increase over the next few months and with rates at all time lows, there will be good buying opportunities.

Home Ownership: The U.S. Homeownership rate has fallen to its lowest level since 1999. Data released by the Census Bureau on 7/27/10 shows that the U.S. homeownership rate dropped to 66.9 percent during the second quarter of this year. With many homeowners becoming renters, landlords are experiencing a surge in rental activity. In the first half of this year there were more apartments rented than all of 2009. The north east area that we live in, offers one of the best purchase price-to-rent ratios in the city along with some of the most unique multi-unit buying opportunities.
