

A big unveiling for Echo Park's Big Belly Modern technology finds a solution to an old problem

Echo Park shoppers agree—they dislike strolling through garbage to reach stores along Sunset Boulevard. But the wire trash baskets aren't emptied often enough and the overflow piles up where passersby walk. What's the answer? More trash bins? Three or four baskets in one place get unsightly. More trash pick-ups? Rolling those trash trucks for extra runs costs too much.

Ida Talalla has lived in Echo Park since 2000 and had her eye on trash for a long time before then. The former resident of New Mexico organized clean-ups there along historic Route 66 and on forest service roads where drivers tossed rubbish out of the car windows. When she moved to Echo Park and began the walks she enjoys so much, Ida quickly realized that Echo Park had a problem too. She saw that trash spilling from street-side baskets was not only a nuisance but also fell into storm drains and polluted Echo Park Lake, helping kill off the famous lotus plants.

The retired school teacher and environmentalist thought she had

I first noticed this house a few years ago when I lived in a dark little apartment across the street, my first Echo Park pad. As the Halloween holiday approached, we watched as an enormous figure took shape in front of our neighbor's home, its giant arms reaching out over the sidewalk and a vague grotesque expression on its face. It was completely made out of paper and tape, surprisingly surviving our street and the weather. It turns out the papier-mâché figure was one of many, and certainly not the last.

Hoping to catch a glimpse of more of these figures, we met up with the artist himself, Glenn Hill. He's lived in his Echo Park home on Douglas Street near Beverly Boulevard for about nine years now. Five or six years ago, he started hosting Halloween parties for fellow 12step program members at his home – and what would a Halloween party be without decorations?

So he started putting up Halloween decorations – but these are no ordinary decorations, and you certainly can't find them at the local Walgreen's. Glenn creates the figures out of recycled newspaper, tape and plastic – anything he's got laying around, or donated by his neighbors, is contributed to the decorations.

In past years, neighborhood kids would come up the street to watch him forming the newest creation. Although he didn't do any decorations last year, and though he's not holding a party this year, questions by neighbor kids and a pile of plastic donated by the Dream Center prompted Glenn to make the Halloween decorations this year.

Glenn doesn't make any of his decorations gory,

although you have to admit they are a little... creepy. "Halloween is not a pretty holiday like Christmas is," he said, "you can do anything you want with Halloween."

He considers making these over-sized papier-mâché monsters therapeutic. The papier-mâché is self-taught – he has an art background but no professional training so to speak. When he started in 2003, the creatures got bigger and bigger, and more creative. "I have no design when I start. I give birth to each from a single sheet of paper."

Surprisingly, no one ever messes with them – they've never been stolen or defaced, rather the neighborhood respects Glenn and his work.

His favorite piece? He doesn't have one! Collectively, they are all his favorite. He sees it as a "way of connecting back to the community that helped me."

When I was first there to interview Glenn, he had one big piece up. The next week he had another. By the time you read this, who knows – maybe he'll have even more! Which means you'll have to check it out on your own before the end of the Halloween holiday. Glenn's house is on Douglas Street, between Colton Street and Beverly Boulevard near the Echo Park Pool. His house is hard to miss!



found a high-tech, lower cost solution to keep Echo Park's sidewalks and gutters clean. However, it took Ida and her small committee five years to convince the city's powers-that-be that cutting edge technology could be the answer to Echo Park's trash-strewn streets. The five committee members-four of them local senior citizens-had to raise thousands of dollars through city grants and "sweat equity" to pay for the first community-supported Big Belly in Los Angeles.

Ida's been a fan of the solar-powered Big Belly trash bin/compactor ever since she found out about it in 2006. By crushing trash inside its bin, the innovative Big Belly can hold up to four times as much trash as a conventional wire basket. It also has a compartment for recycling. Best of all, the Big Belly's on-board computer lets the pickup service know when it's full.

Today Ida credits many local people and institutions for their help, especially the "Keep Los Angeles Beautiful" program of the Board of Public Works. Dozens of Echo Park businesses, believers as soon as the system was explained, wrote more letters of support than there was space for in the grant application; Maryanne Hayashi gave expert assistance; Central City Action Committee was a major help; Pastor David Farley of Echo Park United Methodist provided advice; Councilman Eric Garcetti was a strong supporter as was Councilman Ed Reves; CD13 let them use the recent L.A. Storm Water education program graphic design on the bin's wrap. There were other donors too-the wireless call system manufacturer did not charge for the system it installed; the trash pick-up company, Shelter Clean, promises to pick up from the Echo Park Big Belly free for a year.

Ida's dream was realized on September 14, 2011 when the solar-powered Big Belly trash recycler/ compactor was ceremonially opened for business on the northeast corner of Echo Park Avenue and Sunset Boulevard. Amid afternoon traffic, Ida was thrilled to greet the new Big Belly in its colorful wrapper. Even James Poss, the inventor of the Big Belly, flew in from Massachusetts to witness the red-carpet event. Along with city officials, including Eric Garcetti, Ida and her committee welcomed the new bin to our neighborhood.

Right now Ida's taking time to enjoy the improved cleanliness at the corner. She's looking forward to the first time Big Belly's emptied, but till then, she admits, "I want to look at it every day!"

The Mariachi Festival (from 4:00 pm to 6:00 pm) features LAUSD Middleton Elementary School Mariachi and Flocorico Dancers.


Join your neighbors, family and friends for altars, culture, food, free arts and crafts for kids, and plenty of entertainment - including an art exhibit.

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
